# January Program Jane Tillman

Jane Tillman is our speaker for the January meeting that takes place on February 19 @ 7:00pm at the First National Bank building in Bastrop.

Jane will be presenting on the subject of "Birds in our Lives".

Birds are well-represented in our language, poetry, art and music, and are a surprisingly integral part of everyday life. They permeate our culture from cute owls on pajamas to profound books like I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings. By the end of this talk you will have a greater appreciation for birds, and the enrichment they provide us.

Jane Tillman is an active member of the Travis Audubon Society, a Capital Area Master Naturalist and a past president of the Native Plant Society of Texas, Austin chapter.

Since 2003 Jane has been teaching people how to attract birds to their yards with native plants. She teaches beginning backyard birding classes, leads field trips and gives talks about Central Texas birds to groups including garden clubs, neighborhood associations, birding festivals, libraries, lifelong learning groups, and Kiwanis clubs. Like you, she loves birds.

## What Are You Seeing?

Several recent sightings have piqued local interest. A Black-headed Grosbeak was reported and photographed in Cedar Creek this week.

Mike and Jan Goebel photographed this beautiful, and rare, leucistic Tufted Titmouse in a relative's yard, also in the Cedar Creek area.



Leucism is a condition in which there is partial or total loss of pigmentation in an animal. This is different from albinism, since it is caused by a reduction in multiple types of pigment, not just melanin. If this bird was an albino, its eyes would be pink.
