# November Program

### David Mitchell

Recent news indicate that the abundance of North American avifauna has declined by nearly one-third with a net loss approaching 3 billion birds, or 29% of 1970 abundance (Decline of the North American avifauna, Science, 366, 120-124). Much of the data used in this important study came from the National Audubon's Christmas Bird Count database, to which the Bastrop-Buescher State Parks Christmas Bird Count (BBSPCBC) has been contributing since 1977. In the November meeting, retired Professor David Mitchell will present a program on the BBSPCBC, which he has organized or participated in since 1981. Dr. Mitchell will show detailed diagrams of the populations of individual birds and groups of birds that have occurred over the life of the count. From these diagrams, observations can be made, and conclusions drawn regarding changes in populations here in Bastrop. Our data are fairly consistent with those from the October Science paper with a similar decline in total bird numbers. A detailed look at the individual birds we know and love show gains and losses and many times we can associated such a change with changes in habitat and habitat access (e.g., Bastrop fire). Using a user-friendly statistical approach to some of the data, David shows patterns emerging in species and groups of birds and the significance of these patterns for future populations of individual birds. ### Scout Merit Badge – Fall 2019

As you may remember the local BSA Council requested our help with volunteers to help with Ornithology Merit Badge instruction at the BSA

The past, volunteers can attest that it became a bit stressful as noon approached to heavily encourage and assist the scouts to finish every section. The group discussions this weekend were lively and meaningful. One of my favorite comments was when asked how birds have economic impact, was "around Thanksgiving, many people buy Turkeys"! I have never had two groups in an entire weekend where everyone was on board, engaged, and with zero behavioral issues. Do you think having girls participating made the boys act less goofy? Every single one of you filled essential niches: expert advice on binoculars scopes and finding birds, insightful instruction on range maps and migration, helpful tips on which birds eat birdseed, and general corralling and being positive and encouraging.

We had a few challenges but nothing that was a dealbreaker. The weather patterns were such that it was super quiet for birds on Saturday and it seemed like

Sunday would follow that pattern. After getting an excellent tip from Mike to play an Eastern Screech Owl, followed by a scolding Titmouse call, I used that technique on Sunday's field trip in a more tucked in and woody location to attract a fun mix of chickadees, titmouse, cardinals, bluejays, mocking birds as well as a few Pine Warblers, a Ruby-crowned Kinglet, a Blue-headed Vireo and 2 Black-throated Green Warblers all at once. Saturday's groups had more numerous vulture kettles, while Sunday had a few more species. I am only including this to let everyone know the potential for bird species at the camp this time of the year. I am sure after the big rain last night, things could be quite different today.

I hope that you will all consider joining the fun next spring. I will let you all know the date of the spring Hornaday weekend as soon as I get that information."

When: Dec. 28, Saturday, 6AM-6PM Where: McKinney Roughs Nature Park

This event, sponsored by LCRA, is the Lost Pines Christmas Bird Count (CBC). The count will start and finish at the McKinney Roughs main office, and there is no cost. This is an all-day count with a break for lunch. But you can also bird just half a day if you wish. Tell the CBC leader so they can plan for that when assembling the teams. Generally, there is coffee and breakfast tacos in the morning, and pizza for the evening count down. Plan to bring a lunch unless your zone leader tells you there will be a stop at a local eatery. Registration not required, but if you can, please-please do so. This helps with planning for the birding teams and food. Also, this is one of the very few CBCs that offer a free tee shirt to participants. Get more details at;

When: Jan. 1, Wednesday, 6AM-6 PM Where: Bastrop Christmas Bird Count

Held the first day of 2020, it is actually the 2019 Bastrop CBC. This is another all-day count, which can be a half day count by prior arrangement with your zone leader and, once again, is free. There will be a break for lunch. This count circle includes the city of Bastrop, Bastrop and Buescher State Parks, as well as Lake Bastrop north and south shores. With a wide range of habitats, the Bastrop CBC normally finds 110-130 species. To participate in the Bastrop CBC, you will need to register. The simple reason is that the count does not launch from a central location, so arrive having eaten or bearing breakfast. Once registered you will be assigned to a zone and zone

leader, unless you have a zone/leader preference. The zone leader will contact you with the starting time and location, as well as lunch arrangements. Some zones lunch in the field (authentic but chilly), some grab a quick bite at a zone restaurant (a resourceful option with warm food and facilities).

In the count circle and just want to count birds at your bird feeder holding a cup of hot coffee, can do! Just contact the count compiler Shelia Hargis for the rules and data forms.

The current plan is for a countdown dinner at Morelia Mexican Grill, located at 696 Hwy 71, approximate time 6PM. For more information check out the CBC website:
