- **iNaturalist.org** Data base to report bird and nature sightings and more. You can see what's been reported or can be expected in your local area. Requires a photo of your sighting, but includes an identifier and identification input by other users.

CITIZEN SCIENCE:

- Great Backyard Bird Count, sponsored by the National Audubon Society and the Cornell Lab, takes place in February. www.birdsource.org/gbbc
- Project Feeder Watch (Cornell) -- Watch birds at your feeders 2 days a week, report data to Cornell (participation fee).
- Project Nest Watch (Cornell) --Monitor nesting birds in your area and submit data.
- Christmas Bird Counts –Our area has one in Austin in mid-December, the Lost Pines
 Count (McKinney Roughs/Elgin) in late December, and Bastrop/Buescher on January 1.
 Teams cover area within a 15-mile diameter circle to count every bird. Data goes back
 over 30 years in Bastrop.
