BCAS Receives 2017 Project Grant

BCAS' grant proposal "Posters for Birds" requesting \$1000 was granted recently via Audubon Foundation of Texas.

The project will produce 100 tabloid size posters (11"x 17") featuring birds of Bastrop County using photos by members. Volunteers will distribute about seven different laminated poster versions to all sorts of venues in the County, commercial, non-profit, governmental, etc. The venues could include restaurants, store fronts, churches, banks, and museums, reaching diverse populations, to publicize the BCAS mission, meetings, web site, county birds, and 35th anniversary. We will feature a button for "likes" at the Facebook site.

President's Perch

December is always a special month, some feel "It's the Most Wonderful Time of the Year." It's our holiday season, a time of thanksgiving, a time for family, and, yes, a time for birds.

Since the first Audubon Christmas Bird Count (CBC) led by ornithologist Frank Chapman on Christmas Day, 1900, birders, lovers of nature, supporters of conservation, and individuals wondering "what it's all about," have gathered in December to find and count birds rather than hunt them.

That first count in 1900 was intended to provide an alternative to the holiday tradition known as the Christmas "Side Hunt." The Side Hunt consisted of "choosing up sides", and whichever side brought in the largest pile of feathered and furred game was the winner.

Keep in mind, this first count was prior to the 1905 formation of the National Audubon Society. In 1900, the few Audubon Societies that existed were state-level grass roots organizations, the first being the Massachusetts Audubon Society founded in 1896.

So, that cold Christmas Day, in the final days of the 19th century, 27 dedicated birders participated in 25 Christmas Bird Counts, from Toronto to Pacific Grove, California. The total number of species found that day was 90. A low number by modern standards, where big U.S. counts can top 220 species, and places like Ecuador had 529 species in 2015. But in 1900 field guides did not exist, there were no "birding apps" for your phone (heck, there weren't any phones), and other than ornithologists, "birders" were a rare species.

Living in Bastrop County we are fortunate to have two Christmas Bird Counts, the Lost Pines CBC on December 17th, and the Bastrop CBC on January 1st. I invite you to participate in one . . . or both. You will be immersed in nature, and you will visit parts of beautiful Bastrop County that few people ever see. We will see birds, we will learn about birds, we will contribute to a citizen science project that had its beginnings in 1900, and we will have fun.



Re: The Traditional Carol "Twelve Days of Christmas":

The 12 days of Christmas last from Dec. 26 to Jan. 6, the day that commemorates the gifs of the Wise Men. The "pear tree" probably comes from the French word "perdrix" meaning "partridge," and the "five golden rings" may have originally been "five gold spinks" or goldfinches. The first seven days all represent bird-related gifts.

Audubon CEO Post- Election Message

National Audubon CEO David Yarnold dealt with the expected strategy shifts due to the new Presidential administration in a November 18 email to chapter leaders.

The primary approach to effectiveness especially in its science-based campaign to address climatechange will shift, but values and goals remain the same.

Yarnold stated, "It's clear that the incoming administration will have new conservation priorities and that most of the opportunity to make progress on climate change will shift to the states."

Yarnold believes we are a uniquely formed organization to meet the challenges: "We're a durable, respected, trusted conservation network and we're local everywhere. With 463 chapters and 22 state offices and a membership of one million that's almost evenly divided between D's and R's — we're authentic messengers for birds in every state in the U.S. — and that sets us apart from every other conservation non-profit."
